Latin Project to Begin Fifth Year in District

For the fifth year, the Plainfield and Westfield school districts are offering a Saturday morning Latin program to fifth-grade students. Those students who took part in last year's program are eligible to enroll in the sixth-grade component.

Students from each of the cooperating districts will have the opportunity to study together on 20 Saturday mornings beginning Saturday, October 5. Each session lasts from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., with half the sessions held at Plainfield High School and the other half held at Edison Intermediate School in Westfield.

The primary purpose of the program is to stimulate interest in the structure of language and to demonstrate the relationship of Latin to English, a Westfield school district spokeswoman said. Throughout the country, various initiatives have resulted in increased vocabulary in reading scores on standardized testing for those students who have participated in early Latin language study.

Again this year, two field trip experiences are planned. One trip will be to the Princeton Museum to review "Classical Mythology in Art" and the other to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City to review Pompeian wall paintings, mosaics and statuary.

This year, through a grant from Bell Atlantic-New Jersey, the Plainfield/Westfield Latin Project will enjoy the benefits of technology, including a home page on the Internet and a variety of exercises on the World Wide Web.

Students enrolled in the program will have further opportunities to explore Greek and Roman art, history, mythology and work a great deal in the Latin language and derivation using technology made available from the Bell Atlantic grant.

Junior League Announces 'American Girls' Essay Contest

Girls planning to attend "The American Girls Fashion Show" are invited to submit a 100-word essay describing a special occasion with their favorite American Girl doll.
